On a practical level the benefits of this are obvious - we can coordinate our efforts and grow the event status for the town (ie: if the Chamber of Commerce knows when things like ball tournaments are on they can add things like sidewalk sales the same day). It just makes sense to pool our energy in promoting our community as a whole. There is a side effect to these meetings, though, and that is the feeling of camaraderie when people of diverse interests, but common goals, get together. It's not all business; it's good to visit with our peers as well.
One of the many topics that surfaced in this meeting was volunteer appreciation.
Volunteers are the life blood of everything we try to do. They are invaluable to our community, and yet while their work is vitally important, the people themselves end up standing in the shadows of what they have accomplished. It's not that they are offering their time and talents for glory or fame, but so many times they don't even hear their name mentioned when the work is done.

As Fate would have it, a day or two after this meeting an email arrived announcing that Volunteer Appreciation Day was coming up on April $20^{\text {th }}$. This letter also offered a whole range of ideas of how to thank volunteers. The part that caught my attention was that they had used the same three words that I had been thinking about : recognize, honor, and celebrate. This is exactly how we should show our appreciation to people whose work benefit us all.
I hesitate to use the word 'work' though. It gives volunteerism a bad reputation. It makes it hard to recruit new members. Nobody wants to take on more 'work'.

I am reminded of when I was a kid and doing the dishes was a job that my sisters and I had to do. It was drudgery. It took forever. We argued constantly about who did what. It was a fight every night (sorry Mom). But then, when the extended family got together for a big meal and there were countless more dishes to do it was the adult women who cleared up and did the dishes. They did the much larger job with cheerfulness, conversation and laughter in half the time. The only difference was attitude; I don't know how old I was when this truth finally dawned on me.

I do know, though, that when a group of volunteers are working on a project together this same kind of magic happens. I've said this before many times: "Many hands make light work!".

Being a volunteer is a vitally important contribution to the community in which we live. It's how we build our community but it's also what makes our community worth building. It's where we weave our lives together, where friendships blossom and grow, where we build a collective resilience to weather setbacks and build on our successes.

Their work is so valuable we could never afford to pay them, but our town wouldn't exist without them: that's how important they are.

So, say 'Thank You'. I know to a large extent that means this means mutual 'thank yous' back and forth as so many of us are the very volunteers we wish to honor, but it's important that we recognize each other. And for once people, don't be so humble. When someone thanks you for the work you do, accept the praise - you have earned it!

Go ahead - celebrate your good deeds! You are the true Hometown Heroes.

## Safety is in full bloom this Spring!



With Spring fast approaching, the Carlyle RCMP would like to remind everyone about the importance of intersection/crosswalk safety. As the weather gets warmer, community members of all ages will have more opportunities to enjoy the outdoors.

Accordingto Saskatchewan Government Insurance (\$Gl) over 45\% of all collisions within Saskatchewan occurred at an intersection. (based on the five-year average 2017-2022).

This is an extremely high number and I am happy to share some tips to help you and others stay safe this \$pring:

## Pedestrians:

- Only cross streets at intersections and do not cross in the middle of the block or between parked vehicles;
- Always look both ways before crossing the street and make sure the oncoming vehicle has come to a stop before stepping into the road;
- Wear appropriate clothing and shoes as sidewalk conditions can quickly become icy in Spring;
- Parents/Guardians, te ach your children how to cross the road safely:
- Always use a sidewalk and if one is not available, te ach them to walk as close to the edge of the road as possible;
- Never run out into the street for ANY reason!


## Motorists:

- DO NOT drive while impaired by alcohol or drug;
- DO NOT drive distracted, keep your cell phone out of reach and stay alert;
- Always look for pe destrians and remember, if some one is waiting at the cross walk you must stop to let them cross!
- Be aware of potential jaywalkers as well as kids running out into the street;
- Be patient, especially with seniors, children and pede strians with disabilities;
- Be aware of road conditions as \$pring thaws can lead to icy roads.
- Take caution and reduce your speed when travelling through re sidential are as, school zones and playgrounds.

We encourage anyone who witnesse s/suspects illegal or dangerous behaviour to contact the detachment by calling 310-RCMP or, if it's an emergency, call 911.
