My wish for everyone this holiday season is that you come away from which ever gift giving you choose feeling as joyful as I did while denying I knew anything at all about that random picture showing up on a doorstep in Ontario.

Now, back to my list ... I just thought of a couple more things that need to be on it.





MISSOULA CHILDREN'S THEATRE VISITS WITH KING ARTHUR'S OUEST

Redvers School and the Redvers Arts Council welcomed the Missoula Children's Theatre (MCT) production of *King Arthur's Quest* to town for a busy and fun-filled week from November 27 to December 1. The MCT team of Olivia Sheppard and Hans Pfrang arrived in town in their "little red truck" loaded with a set, costumes, props and everything it takes to put on a play... except the cast. The team held an open audition on Monday and cast over 50 local students to perform or assist in the production. Rehearsals were held throughout the week with final rehearsals and two public performances presented on Friday, Dec 1st at the Redvers School Gymnasium. It was a busy week with rehearsals creating a buzz after school daily this week. In addition, the fun crossed into school hours as the MCT tour directors also led five workshops during their residency in Redvers.



The cast and crew of the play was a wide cross-section of our local school population with not only over 30 students from grade K to 6 involved, but also over 25 students from grades 7 to 12. Many of the oldest students had not acted in school drama since their elementary school days and attended the auditions on Monday not knowing what their week would actually have in store for them.

King Arthur's Quest was an original musical adaptation of the story of King Arthur and featured well-known characters from the Arthurian legend: King Arthur, Guinevere, Lancelot, Merlin, the Knights of the Round Table and a host of others in this telling of the classic tale.

The cast and crew featured local students from Redvers, Bellegarde, and Manor. Playing the title character of King Arthur was Colby Raymond. Other featured performers include Asia Jorgensen as Guinevere; Carson Gervais as Merlin; Whitney Purvis as the Raven; Ava Steenbruggen as Taliesin; Everett Shaw as Lancelot; Rayanne Poirier as the Lady of the Lake; Cade Mohrbutter as Uther Pendragon; Carter Hildebrandt as Mordred; and Blessy Butong as Morgan Le Fey. Appearing as the Camelotians were Sasha Toms, Nikita Buydens, Charliegh Fidierchuk, Harper Demas, Emily Englot, Braeley Hoff, Lauren Hannah, Emma Hutton, Dawson James, Aleris Gavelin, and Lyndon Leatherdale. The Damsels were played by Eve Marsh, Keeleigh Richardson, Feline Jurista, Elsie McIntyre, Sierra McColl, McKenna Richards, and Rylee Garnier. The roles of the Minis were performed by Isabelle Axten, Brandy Englot, Bailey Richards, Hux Garnier, Alexis Bedecs, Henri Hjertaas, Sophie Hutton, Iszack McCurry, Holly Matthewson, Emma McIntyre, Brooklyn Hannah, Madison Birch, Emma-Lee Sakal, and Emily Knelsen. Kyler Kamp, Deylyn Melville, Serenidee James, and James Tinant served as Assistant Directors throughout the week, while Valen Keating was the musical accompanist. Additional help was provided by Rachel Tinant, Hadley Garnier, Clara Bonotti and Chloe George. The students were under the direction of the tour's MCT directors: Olivia Sheppard and Hans Pfrang.

The two performances were well received by the audience. The final bow featured lots of applause and a standing ovation! The students did an excellent job of hiding their jitters and showed off their hard work from the week. And the singing! Many excellent singing voices were on display during the shows!



It has been ten years since the Missoula Children's Theatre has had a residency in Redvers. While admission fees helped recoup some of the costs of the MCT residency (including school workshops and performances), the Redvers Arts Council supported the production by picking up the full MCT fee and Redvers School assisted by providing a venue and enthusiastic students. Redvers Arts Council member Melissa Toms was keen to bring back the MCT to Redvers. Says Melissa, "after volunteering with youth in our community, I really felt the need to find more opportunities for arts, culture, and drama for our kids. My nieces performed with MCT years ago, and they really enjoyed it. I went ahead and researched MCT, made a proposal to the Arts Council, and here we are today. It has been rewarding to see that student and parent response surpassed our expectations."

All the staff from South East Research Farm are sending warm wishes for Christmas. South East Research Farm, a crop research based non-profit organization, was established in 1997 aiming to improve agricultural sustainability and encourage environmental stewardship. Farm is located approx. 6 km south of the town and 4 km east of the #8 Hwy.


Annual memberships are available for \$20. Currently the chair of the board is Edgar Hammermeister and the vice-chair is Kevin Judd. Other members of the board are Colin Rosengren, Lee Sluser, Jared Nelson, Joceline Raisbeck Rempel, Anita Renwick, Kylie McRae. Mackenzie Hladun also serves on the board as a provincial representative. Research conducted by the organization is supervised by Executive Director Lana Shaw, PAg, MSc and new addition Anmol Matharu is replacing Ishita Patel in conducting the research program. In order to serve the research and demonstration needs of diverse kinds of farmers, South East Research Farm works with the Saskatchewan Ministry of Agriculture, agri-businesses, universities, commodity groups, rural municipalities, and Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada. The farm is intended to connect research results with producers, bringing the results of breeding and agronomic research to the local area.

Recently the farm staff attended the agriculture funding promotion event at Redvers legion hall on 8th Nov, organized by The Lower Souris Watershed Committee. The farm staff also attended the Indigenous Ag Summit at Canadian Western Agribition held at Regina to connect with Indigenous communities, land managers and new research initiatives like the Bridge to Land Water Sky Living Laboratory.







LOCAL WOMAN TURNS PAPERS INTO BOOKS

You could say Jeannine Gaudet is a collector. You could also say she's an avid reader of the Optimist. The Redvers woman began collecting copies of the Redvers Optimist more than 50 years ago (*now 60*), and has 48 books complete (*now 54*) with one newspaper from each week of the year. She has a few other years almost complete, with the exception of a few missing weeks.

Gaudet began collecting papers when she watched as her husband Paul's father, Joseph Gaudet, passed his time by sewing together a year's worth of copies of the Redvers Optimist. "He made many books and he really enjoyed doing it," says Gaudet. "That was something for him to do when he retired. He was so happy with his books, so proud of them."

She watched with interest over the years as he put these books together and when the time came, he taught her how to make the books so she could carry on his work when he was no longer able. "It came that he was becoming blind and he couldn't do it anymore," she recalls. "I could tell that he wanted somebody from the family to keep it up. I thought, 'this would be a nice hobby for me.' So I watched him and told him I would take that hobby on. I've made 48 books since then."



Each of her 48 books includes one paper from each week of the year. Her archive runs from 1961 to the

present time (to 2016 when publication ended). She has almost every paper from 1960, however is missing a few and therefore has not been able to make a book for that year as of yet. She also has many papers from the 1950's, but has not been able to put any full books together – though she still has hopes in the future.

For the older years, many of her papers came from auction sales. She attended many sales, but when she was too busy she says her friends would surprise her by attending the sales and picking up boxes of newspapers for her to sift through. Throughout the year, each week after she was finished reading her Redvers Optimist paper, she would lay it flat in the drawer and watch as they piled up throughout the year. At the end of the year when she placed her last Optimist in the drawer, she would get ready to make the book for that year.

To make each book, she carefully sews each paper from the inside of the middle so they are all connected together. Once she's finished the sewing process – which she does by hand – her husband Paul put wooden covers on the book and lay it on a press. If she had the time to sit and do all the sewing at once, she says it would take her about a day to sew it. However, it usually takes her a few days as she works away at it whenever she has time.

Gaudet arguably has the largest archived collection of Redvers Optimist newspapers and it's a collection she hopes will continue to grow. She has no intention of giving up this hobby anytime soon, but at the same time has no idea what will happen to the books when she does give up her hobby. But that's something for her to worry about later. For now she's just having fun. "I really enjoy doing this," says Gaudet.

In 2023, Paul and Jeannine Gaudet generously donated their entire collection of bound Redvers Optimist newspaper books to the Town of Redvers. Town Council thought that these books deserved to be viewed instead of collecting dust, so in July the books were moved over to the Redvers Library. All 54 copies can be accessed by the public. Since these books are delicate and one-of-a-kind, they may not be checked out, but patrons are welcome to read them while visiting the library. A memorial plaque of Paul & Jeannine's donation was created to commemorate the decades of dedication that this project took.

Thank you to the Gaudet family for this priceless collection!

Gingerbread

75g butter
3 1/2tbsp golden syrup
60g light soft brown sugar
175g plain flour
1/4 tsp bicarbonate of soda
2tsp ground ginger

- Add butter, golden syrup and light brown sugar to a pan. Stir on a low heat until sugar has dissolved.
- Add flour, bicarbonate of soda and ginger to a mixing bowl then stir together. Make a well in the centre and pour in the sugar and butter mixture.
- Stir together to form a dough (it might be easiest to use your hands).
- · wrap in clingfilm and let chill for 30mins to firm up.
- Lay the dough between two sheets of baking parchment.
 Press dough lightly with a rolling pin. Give a quarter turn than repeat.
- Give it a final quarter turn, then start to roll backwards and forwards, giving regular quarter turns.
 until dough is roughly thickness of a £1 coin.
- using a biscuit cutter out out the shapes.
 Bake at 190°C (170°C fan) mark 5 for 10 to 12min.
 until lightly golden brown.
- The biscuits won't be firm but will harden when left to cool putside the oven.


